

Elementary Schools

OD Elementary Adds to Music Program

Music is such an important part of a child's education. OD Elementary has welcomed Joyce Anderson as the new music teacher and she is thrilled to be in this position! She has been in OD for 22 years, but this is her first year in music. Her goal for her students is for them to walk out of her classroom with a tune in their head and have a basic idea of how to read music.

This goal is being made possible first by learning to play boomwhackers (individual colorful plastic pipes representing the different notes in a musical scale). This is a new addition to the music room as of this year. Under Anderson's direction, second and third graders are able to play various songs. During this process, she speaks the note (boomwhacker) that needs to be played and provides the timing. At some point, students will be put into small groups and given a short piece of music that will reflect the colorful boomwhacker/notes and work on learning to play the song while reading the music on their own.

The music program was awarded a \$500 grant by Northern Indiana Community Foundation this past month for three musical keyboards for the classroom. Oregon-Davis School Corporation will match the amount of this grant, giving our music department \$1,000 to spend on the keyboards. Learning to play the keyboards will help reach the goal of teaching basic music skills to students. Instead of working in small groups, students will work individually on the keyboards.

Indiana History Quilting Project

April Max's students are making individual Indiana history quilts. Each student will design six blocks based on Indiana's history. They are researching the topics, writing a 5-paragraph paper on each topic, designing a quilt block with paper and colored pencil and creating four slides for a slide show about each block.

Max is making photo fabric and will run their blocks designs through a printer. Each block will have a fabric border added to it. Two local quilt guilds will be helping to put the blocks together and then the kids will tie their quilts. Each child will have a lap quilt or wall hanging to take home at the end of the year. In the spring, they will present their quilts with the slides at a quilt show which will be open to the public. Photos of the quilts will also be shared with the Indiana Historical Society.

This project was made possible through two grants that Max applied for. The first grant was from Donor's Choose and covered the cost of the ink. The second grant was from the Starke County Community Foundation. Fabric donations have also been received.

The most difficult part of grant writing is being able to share the project details in a limited amount of words. The grant applications limit the amount of words because the organizations have a limited amount of time to read the applications. Projecting costs, planning the project, and then conveying the project details to others are a lot of work! Max applied for four different grants to fund this project and was very fortunate to receive two grants.
